Estimated play time: Approximately 15 minutes

Number of players: Unlimited

Supplies needed: Scoring board/pad; noisemakers

Suitable for visually impaired players.

Overview:

All the answers in this game contain two-word phrases that begin with the initials **RR**.

Instructions:

1. This game can be played by individuals or in teams.
2. Read the first question. Discussion is permitted among teammates. Prior to the start of the game, a method to signal when a team is ready to answer must be determined. Ringing bells and New Year's blowers are just two inexpensive noisemakers. Raised hands work, but the host must be vigilant to watch for whose hand went up first. The host always has the final say in any disputes.
3. After a player/team is recognized as the first to signal, they may give an answer. If the first answer is incorrect, the other teams may "buzz" in and answer.
4. Scoring: Give 10 points for each correct answer.

1. Anger, sometimes violent, exhibited by automobile drivers.
2. A badge or award that usually signifies a second-place win in a contest.
3. This track and field competition usually involves passing a baton to the next competitor.
4. In the US, this term refers to politically conservative Christians.
5. This British car company produced its first Phantom model in 1925. Today, a Phantom will set you back \$460,000 or more.
6. This exterior auto accessory is a convenient means of transporting skis or a great deal of luggage on a driving vacation.
7. Among his memorable movie roles are Jeremiah Johnson, Jay Gatsby, Hubbell Gardiner, and *Washington Post* journalist Bob Woodward.
8. The term used for power sources, such as solar or wind, that will not eventually run out, like coal, gas, or oil.
9. An area in a house, commonly in the basement, that is used for games, children's play, and parties.
10. Originally meaning trash or rubbish, this term is more usually used nowadays to describe a group of disreputable or worthless people.
11. Nickname given to the 1st United States Volunteer Cavalry during the Spanish-American War. (Young Teddy Roosevelt was second-in-command.)
12. A person who stirs up the passions or prejudices of a crowd of people, usually to advance his or her own interests.
13. Celebrity chef, author, and queen of the thirty-minute meal, she has a syndicated network show and three Food Network series.
14. This phrase originated in the late 1930s, and it is still used to describe a high-pressure urban working life spent trying to get ahead with little time left for anything else.
15. This upscale restaurant and nightclub in New York's Rockefeller Center, famous for its revolving dance floor and colorful decor, was a popular venue for Billie Holiday, Duke Ellington, and Frank Sinatra in the 1930s and 1940s.
