Elegant English

Estimated play time: Approximately 15 minutes

Number of players: Unlimited

Supplies needed: Scoring board/pad; noisemakers

Suitable for visually impaired players.

Overview:

The words in this game are not obscure, but they are not commonly used in everyday conversation. For example, most of us would say, "The star of that movie had black hair and very pale, white skin." But perhaps a more elegant word choice would be to say that the movie star had *alabaster* skin.

In this game, we provide a list of "elegant" words. You should first try to come up with the correct definitions on your own. If you can't, we have provided three definitions from which you must choose the correct one.

We will be posting this game format regularly until we complete the alphabet. This week, we are looking at elegant words that begin with the letter K.

Instructions:

- 1. This game can be played by individuals or in teams.
- 2. Read the first word and ask for its definition. Discussion is permitted among teammates. Prior to the start of the game, a method to signal when a team is ready to answer must be determined. Ringing bells and New Year's blowers are just two inexpensive noisemakers. Raised hands work, but the host must be vigilant to watch for whose hand went up first. The host always has the final say in any disputes.
- 3. After a player/team is recognized as the first to signal, they may give an answer. If the first answer is incorrect, the other teams may "buzz" in and answer.
- 4. If no one comes up with the correct definition, read the three possible answers.
- 5. As before, the first player/team to signal may give an answer. If the answer is incorrect, the others may "buzz" in.
- 6. Score 10 points for each correct answer. Play until all questions have been asked and answered.

QUESTIONS

- Lanyard: (LAN•yerd)
 - A: A strap to hold something, such as a whistle, around the neck.
 - B: A pen or area of a farm where sheep are kept.
 - C: A chain or rope that is attached to an anchor.
- 2. Limpid: (LIM•pid)
 - A: A small marine mollusk in the barnacle family.
 - B: Numb; unable to move.
 - C: Very clear; unclouded.
- 3. Lyceum: (lie∙SEE•um)
 - A: The area of a church that is exclusively used for sermons.
 - B: A room or building where historical documents are preserved.
 - C: A hall for public lectures.
- 4. Laconic: (la•CON•ic)
 - A: Lazy; shiftless.
 - B: Using very few words; brief and to the point.
 - C: A person, or idea, that is flawed or defective.
- 5. Lugubrious: (la•GOO•bree•iss)
 - A: Excessively mournful or gloomy.
 - B: Drunk.
 - C: Having a tendency to overeat.
- 6. Lachrymose: (LACK•rah•mohse)
 - A: Unimaginative; dull.
 - B: A glue used in heavy construction.
 - C: To shed, or to cause, tears.
- 7. Lapidary: (LAP•ah•derry)
 - A: A gem cutter.
 - B: A rabbit breeder.
 - C: A system of interconnected beehives.
- 8. Lido: (LEE•dough)
 - A: A traditional Japanese home.

- C: A beach resort, usually one that is considered fashionable.
- 9. Logorrhea: (log•ah•REE•ah)
 - A: An excessive use of words. .
 - B: A condition of being constantly exhausted.

 - B: Money, especially when acquired in a dishonorable way.

 - B: A manual used by libraries (before the advent of the computer) that sorted the book collection by subject matter.

 - B: A loud, but very beautiful, speaking of singing voice.
