Famous Animal Watching

Estimated play time: Varies

Number of players: Unlimited

Supplies needed: Scoring board/pad. If you cannot put the image on a screen of some sort, you will need to print a copy of this game for each player or team.

Overview:

Take a look at the given images, answer the question(s), and we'll see just how wide is your knowledge of famous animals – real or fictional, living or otherwise.

Instructions:

1. This game can be played by individuals or in teams.
2. Show the first image. Discussion is permitted among teammates. Prior to the start of the game, a method to signal when a player/team is ready to answer must be determined. Ringing bells and New Year's blowers are just two inexpensive noisemakers. Raised hands work, but the host must be vigilant to watch for whose hand went up first. The host always has the final say in any disputes.
3. After a player/team is recognized as the first to signal, they may give an answer. If the first answer is incorrect, the others may 'buzz' in and answer.
4. Keep score (10 points for each answer) after each question is answered correctly. Play until all questions have been asked and answered.

1. What's the name of this mystery-solving dog? And what breed of dog is he?



2. What's the name of this singing and dancing character, who was introduced on PBS in 1992? And what kind of animal is he ... specifically?



3. What's the name of this horse ... and what TV show was he on from 1949 to 1957?



4. Can you name this overweight, lazy, orange tabby cat ... and also identify his favorite food?



5. Can you identify this breed of horse and the company that introduced them to the public in 1933 to celebrate the repeal of Prohibition?



6. Who is this?
(We're looking for the name of the animal, not the man.)



7. Who is this?



8. Can you name the monkey, the man, and the TV show they were on?



9. Who is this canine "actor," and in what 1939 movie was he featured?



10. Can you name this dog and the show he co-starred in?
And for extra kudos, what breed of dog is he?



11. You can probably name this TV horse, but can you name the character who owned him?



12. Can you name this cat and to whom it belonged?



13. What animal is depicted in this 1934 photograph?



14. Who are this man and this horse?



15. Can you identify this 1944 movie and give the name of the horse?



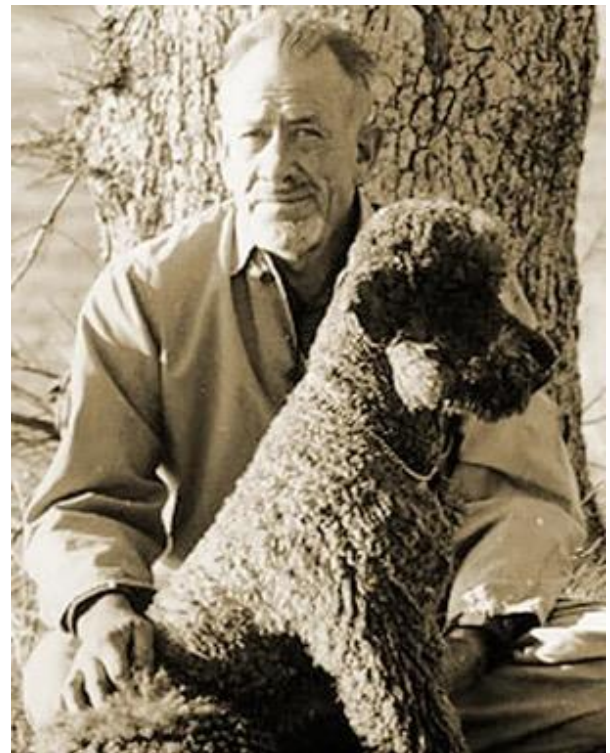
16. It's probably obvious who the man is, but can you come up with the name of the black and white cocker spaniel?
