# Weekly Find the Words 

Estimated play time: Approximately 15 minutes
Number of players: Unlimited
Supplies needed: Pencils and paper for each player, depending on how you play May be suitable for visually impaired players.

## Overview:

Sunday, March 13 marks the beginning of Daylight Saving Time ("spring" your clocks forward by one hour). We may lose an hour of sleep, but we get longer days - one of the first signs that spring is on its way. For this game, how many five-letter words can you make from the letters in the phrase LONGER DAYS? (Note: We found 125 five-letter words!)

[^0]1. Go around the room and have players (one at a time) identify the 5-letter words. You could set a goal of finding at least 50\% of the correct answers.
2. Make it a timed contest. Hand out page 2 of this document (or a blank piece of paper) and give your players two or three (or more) minutes to write down as many words as they can. The player with the most (legitimate) words is the winner.
3. Play as described in \#2, but have the players work in teams of two or three.

To add a little extra fun, we've added a secret word. (You can find it on the answer page.) If you are scoring the game, give the player or team who gets the secret word double points. If you're not scoring, perhaps you can give them a small prize -a piece of chocolate, a \$1 lottery ticket, a lollipop, etc.
In addition, you will see that we've marked some words with asterisks. These words are a bit harder to get. Again, if you are scoring, you might give an extra point or two to the person/team who gets an "asterisked" word.
