## **Overview:**

You already know how to play trivia quizzes. Here are a few additional ideas to consider if you want a more, or less, competitive game.

### Instructions

- 1. Create a tournament format in which permanent teams compete in playoffs and a final champion team is crowned.
- 2. Collect a small amount of money from each player (for example, 50 cents or a dollar) and put it into a kitty. The winning team splits the kitty.
- 3. Buy some lottery tickets to use as prizes for the winners (and runners up).
- 4. To create a less competitive game, just give one point for every question answered.

## **"A" IN SCIENCE**

- 10 Pts From the Greek word for "dissection," this branch of science is concerned with the structure of the human body and all its parts.
- 20 Pts This condition occurs when your blood has a lower than normal amount of red blood cells or hemoglobin.
- 30 Pts This term for a person or animal that lacks pigmentation comes from the Latin word for "white."
- 40 Pts Commonly called the Northern Lights, this natural phenomenon of streams of reddish or greenish lights in the sky is caused by the interaction of charged particles from the sun with atoms in the upper atmosphere.
- 50 Pts This hormone is secreted by the adrenal glands, especially in conditions of stress. It increases your heart rate and breathing and prepares your muscles for exertion.
